Dear Sir:

I have your letter of May 14 relative to the communication I addressed to Dr. Robert C. Weaver of the Department of the Interior. Since writing Dr. Weaver, I made a trip to Georgetown, South Carolina, and saw Negro women on the streets digging ditches.

Working conditions throughout the South are of such that it is difficult for Negroes to get consideration in the matter of white collar jobs. In certain parts of South Carolina, as well as in other states, no white collar jobs are given Negroes. I believe it is the policy of the Federal Government that no discrimination is to be practiced in the various projects.
