"As co-ordinator of Negro activities activities on WPA projects in the city, Mrs. Inez Richardson Wilson deserves much of the credit for this display of the work. Figuratively speaking. Mrs. Wilson, while serving in the capacity of co-ordinator of Negro activities on WPA projects, has a job that equals that of a Moses. It is her duty to lead her people through the wilderness of red tape, official regulations, race prejudices, age-old ideas and misconceptions, toward the promised land of equal opportunity....

"Mrs. Wilson has seen Harlem's own theatre established under Federal auspices; she has heard music played by WPA bands and orchestras; she had established a class in cosmetic chemistry which teaches future beauticians how to mix their own materials; she has been an innovator, upheld by I. Gerdy, director of the education division, to the extent that Harlem is going to school again, not only in community centers but also in churches of their own choice.

"Since Harlem has suffered perhaps more than any other section of the city as a result of the depression, Mrs. Wilson hates to think what would happen here were it not for the WPA."

DENTAL CLINIC OPENED FOR HARLEM

The Amsterdam News reports that the dental clinic at 200 West 135th Street in Harlem, sponsored by the Emergency Relief Bureau and conducted by WPA personnel, is filling a long-felt need.

The clinic is one of two in Manhattan.

"The treatment is entirely free. The service includes filling, extractions and restoration work. A dental laboratory is maintained where restorations are manufactured. All work is done by qualified professionals.

"Of the patients, eighty-five per cent have been recommended by the ERB, the remaining fiftten per cent having been referred by other recognized welfare agencies. To qualify for treatment all that is needed is recommendation from an established welfare agency.

"An illuminating display of the work accomplished by this service may be seen at the forthcoming series of WPA exhibitions, which opened Monday at the Seventy-first Regiment Armory, and comes to the 369th Regiment Armory, 142nd street and Lenox avenue, on Tuesday."
