

"Admittedly, Governor Landon believes in the fundamental rights of all men. He sent a telegram to the Negro Planning Board expressing his belief in the equality of all men. We cannot continue to prattle about the inalienable rights of all men to liberty, while at the same time and in the same country we torture, burn and kill colored men and women in order to terrorize and subject them to a place lower than that occupied by other Americans."

"Security and protection of life and limb is the first need and demand of the American Negro. Let candidate Landon speak and mean what he says. Basic human rights outweigh relief checks. Let candidate Landon hit the line hard. Let him tell the nation so that Pat Harrison, Joe Robinson, Jack Garner and President Roosevelt can hear that in the event of his election lynch murder is doomed, that every ounce of his energy will be directed to enact Federal legislation that will end this disgrace to civilization. Franklin Delano Roosevelt muffed this opportunity to write his name among the stars. Seize it, Governor Landon, as the highest duty of a public servant to protect the lives of even the most humble."
